Eurasian Visions and Entanglements

Geopolitics and Religions, Past and Present

This workshop aims at offering an overview of the various visions about Eurasia which have been articulated and disseminated in past and present times alike. It is about ideas, conceptions, ideological schemes or socio-political programs with regard to a common Eurasian space and its implications, usually as terrain of identification or confrontation between religious and political (imperial and/or national) identities and legitimations. In different historical situations, "Eurasian" geographical and geopolitical spaces have been seen or conceived as mediums, channels and messages for political, cultural and religious influence. Later, in modern memory, these past paths of mission, spaces of communication or areas of expansion have also became core-elements of "invented history" for actual religious, political or social purposes. It is thus about a history of multi-faceted contacts and/or expansion and a (partially "invented") memory of this history. In this broader context, various forms of entanglement between Europe and Asia will be also examined, even if they were not associated with a specific Eurasian vision. The workshop will address this wide topic on the basis of selected case-studies. The issue of Eurasia from the perspective of a comparative civilisational analysis will be also a central point of reference during the workshop.
