PROJECT

BuddhistRoad aims to create a new framework to enable understanding of the complexities in the dynamics of cultural encounter and religious transfer in premodern Eastern Central Asia—a region that was the crossroads of ancient civilisations whose uniqueness was determined by complex dynamics of religious and cultural exchanges gravitating around an ancient communication artery, commonly referred to as the Silk Road.

The spread of Buddhism overrode the ethnic and linguistic boundaries along the Silk Road creating a civilisational whole, which despite its diversity, expressed a set of common Buddhist ideas from various cultural perspectives. One specific aspect of this process in Eastern Central Asia was the rise of the local forms of Buddhism. The project intends to investigate such Buddhist localisations between the 6^{th} – 14^{th} centuries.

CONFERENCE

The aim of this, the 2^{nd} conference of the BuddhistRoad project, is to investigate different aspects of material culture and transfer in and between the Central Asian Buddhist communities during the $6-14^{th}$ centuries, as well as dealing with issues relating to ritual and religious practices. Material transfer includes the exchange of iconographical models and religious imagery, book culture, cave sanctuaries, etc. Ritual practices as conceived here is meant to focus on the transmission, formulation and re-formulation of salient forms of ritual performances, including meditation and visualisation. Given that rituals generally take place in pre-arranged, ritual spaces, it is in the nature of things that a certain overlapping between material culture and ritual practices has taken place in Central Asian Buddhism, something that is also likely to be borne out in a number of the presentations.

It is hoped that a more inclusive approach afforded by the two over-arching topics of the conference will assist us in the formulation of new methods of research.
